## **II.** Course Assignments:

- 1. Era summarizations: Homework in the form of era matching that are completed at the end of each era (Medieval, Renaissance, Baroque, Classical, Romantic, and 20<sup>th</sup> Century) respectively.
- 2. Weekly quizzes as they pertain to the weeks module(s).
- 3. Recording review due by the end of the semester, date TBD
  - a. Students are to choose an opera that interests them from the "opera synopsis" section under FILES and seek out a recording or a DVD performance from the library or alternatively find a YouTube of the entire opera with English subtitles to watch. Write a 2-page paper, double-spaced, discussing the composer, the librettist, the synopsis or plot, and what you generally liked or disliked about the opera. Be very specific in your examples used.
- 4. Live performance review due by the end of the semester, date TBD
  - a. Students must attend one live musical performance and write a review of that performance. Acceptable concerts include but not limited to: symphony concerts, choral concerts, chamber concerts, student recitals, and jazz concerts. Performances that are not acceptable include: 'pop' concerts or performances that lack substantial musical depth.
  - b. I try my best to secure either complimentary (free) or steeply discounted tickets to area symphony concerts or symphony programs in which I will be performing but I make no guarantee that will happen. Furthermore, you understand that it is your responsibility as the student to fulfill this particular portion of the course requirements should I prove unable to secure complimentary or discounted tickets. Many symphony/choral concerts are free at area colleges.
  - c. In the event of continued COVID-19 measures, students may utilize the apps provided to them by the instructor to fulfill the course requirement.
