All quizzes/exams are administered via Canvas. Students receive (3) attempts to complete each quiz/exam to allow for any unforeseen technical difficulties that may arise. Students are responsible for maintaining the necessary materials for taking this class including computers and internet access. If technical difficulties arise, it is the student's responsibility to seek out the appropriate support before the coursework is due.

Students should attempt to complete the quizzes/exams as soon as possible after they become available/accessible, and not wait until right before they are due, so technical issues can be resolved before the due date. Quiz/exam questions are administered in random order with no back-tracking. There will be module or chapter quizzes. Quizzes/exams may not be made up. Students are responsible for making sure their work has been submitted.
