J. <u>Course Description</u>: This course develops basic speaking, listening, writing, and reading skills. The goal is for students to achieve a Novice Mid-level of proficiency across all the aforementioned skills. At this level, students will be able to engage in simple interpersonal exchanges. They will also be able to present and understand information about themselves and their immediate surroundings using words, phrases, and memorized expressions while speaking and listening, reproduce from memory a modest number of words and phrases in context while writing, and identify a number of highly contextualized words and phrases including cognates and borrowed words while reading. Also, students will have an introduction to Hispanic Cultures by examining a variety of topics. This course is not intended for native speakers of Spanish.

You should review your grades regularly and should notify the instructor ASAP if you have any questions or discover a discrepancy.

- a. **Discussions Boards:** They are for the most part a 2-part approach. You receive points for your post, and you receive the remaining points for responding to one of classmates' posts. Your original post must contain at least 150 words, or a media component, and references.
- b. **Assignments/Homework:** You will have an opportunity to redo these activity if you did not receive at least 70% in your first attempt.

Homework: through Open source textbook.

Practice: through Open source textbook.

c. Quizzes/Test: After you complete your homework/assignments activities, you will have vocabulary/grammar/unit tests, to assess your understanding of the information presented in order for me to determine if more practice is needed before moving on. There are not exams in this class, instead, at the end of each unit, you will have an end of unit test to assess your overall comprehension of the language. These tests are performance-based.

#### IV. <u>Examination Policy</u>:

- 1. The reasons for which a student will be excused from taking an examination are:
  - a. Hospitalization (with documented verification)
  - b. Death in the immediate family (with documented verification)
  - c. Personal illness or illness in immediate family (doctor's excuse required).
  - d. Special circumstances communicated to the instructor.
- 2. A student who misses an examination for any reason is responsible for:
  - a. Contacting the instructor
  - b. Emailing the reasons of the missed assessment.
  - c. Making up the word in a scheduled agreement with the instructor.
- 3. No makeup opportunity will be given for absences not communicated to the instructor via email, text or Canvas inbox.

### V. <u>Class Attendance and Homework Make-Up Policy</u>:

- 1. Class attendance is necessary to acquire the knowledge required to become proficient in the language.
  - a. If a student has not attended 60% of the class, he/she will be withdrawn.
  - b. If you are absent for two consecutive weeks (not submitting a single assignment), it will result in your being withdrawn from the course. Exemptions will be made only if communicated to the instructor.
- 2. Students are responsible for completing assignments by the due date.
  - a. If an assignment is completed late, there will be a 5% deduction per day.
  - b. If an student has not completed 75% of the assigned work, he/she will be withdrawn.

**Important**: If you submit work after the due date, Canvas will automatically assign a grade of "0" (zero) even if you have uploaded the assignment. Rest assured, this grade will be updated once I manually grade your late submission.

However, in order for late work to be graded, you must email me a **detailed list** of the assignments you submitted late. Simply submitting the work in Canvas is not sufficient, as I may have already reviewed the gradebook before your submission appeared.

Late work will not be graded without this notification.

## VI. Classroom Expectations:

You are encouraged to come to our course with an open mind and work on developing a mindset throughout our time together. An open mind is critical of developing the skills learned in our course and will not happen unless you are completely willing to try learning and using the language. Simply put, what you get out of the course is what you put into it!

- a. Consider using bullet points to help highlight your main points or headings if your post needs to be lengthy.
- b. No Yelling, when you write in uppercase letters in online communication, it is usually interpreted as yelling.
- c. Add some emotion: sometimes it helps communicate the tone of your massage when you add an emoticon. However, only do so as necessary for it can be annoying to readers if you use too many.
- d. Always reach out to your instructor whenever/if you have any questions about anything. I am here for all of you throughout the course. I usually respond in less than 24h except on weekends. If you email on a Friday, it will be most likely I will respond on Monday.
