D. <u>Examination Policy</u>:

- 1. The reasons for which a student will be excused from taking an examination:
 - a. Hospitalization (with documented verification)
 - b. Death in the immediate family (with documented verification)
 - c. Personal illness or illness in the immediate family (doctor's excuse required).
 - d. A student who misses an exam due to illness, death in the family, or other valid reason must inform the instructor within one day. They will be given the opportunity to make up the assignment or quiz.
- 2. No makeup opportunity will be given for absences of unscheduled quizzes. Special accommodations can be made if the student is out for a longer period. It is the responsibility of the student to schedule the make-up assignment or quiz with the instructor; afterward. If a student is unable to make up the assignment or quiz due to illness, make-ups will NOT be administered if a valid doctor's note is not provided directly to the instructor. There are no exceptions!!

E. Class Attendance and Homework Make-Up Policy:

- 1. The instructor needs to be notified as soon as possible if a student needs to miss class or will be unable to turn in an assignment on time. Due to the nature of some of the planned in-person class discussions, make-ups may be impossible to accomplish, and substitute assignments may be given. Exceptions (such as illness, family emergency, etc.) can be made on a case-by-case basis.
- 2. The student is responsible for arranging make-up assignments with the instructor. Late assignments without a valid excuse may not be graded, subject to the instructor's discretion.

Late Assignments:

- 1. Submitting assignments after the deadline indicates poor time management. Late submissions will not be accepted unless there is a death in the family or a serious illness or crisis involving the student or an immediate family member. Prenotification and approval from the instructor are required for late submissions, and failing to do so will result in the loss of all points for the assignment, discussion, or activity.
- 2. pre-approved late assignments may be **penalized by at least 10 percent of the grade** and must be turned in within one week of the original due date. Grades of "incomplete" for the course will be granted under extenuating circumstances.
