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Exam Scheduling

- Exams will be administered during scheduled class sessions unless otherwise arranged with facility staff.
- If an exam must be rescheduled due to institutional disruptions (e.g., lockdowns, transfers, medical appointments), the instructor will coordinate with education staff to offer a makeup opportunity.

Exam Format

- Exams may include multiple-choice, short answer, essay, or case study questions depending on course objectives.
- All exams will be completed using approved materials (e.g., paper, pencil) and within the time limits set by the instructor.
- Open-book or take-home exams may be offered only with prior approval and under supervision.

Makeup Exams

- Students with excused absences will be allowed to take a makeup exam within a reasonable timeframe (typically one week).
- Missed exams due to unexcused absences may result in a zero unless exceptional circumstances are documented and approved by both facility and instructor.

Academic Integrity

- Cheating, copying, or unauthorized collaboration during exams is strictly prohibited.
- Any violation of exam integrity will result in disciplinary action, which may include a failing grade for the exam or further consequences per college policy.

Support & Preparation

- Review sessions or study guides may be provided prior to exams.
- Students are encouraged to ask questions and seek clarification on exam topics during class or through the education coordinator.

IV. Class Attendance and Homework Make-Up Policy:

Attendance is a vital part of your success in this course. Due to the structured environment of the correctional facility, attendance expectations are adapted as follows:

- Scheduled Class Sessions: Students are expected to attend all scheduled class sessions unless excused by facility staff (e.g., lockdowns, medical appointments, legal obligations).
