Clinical Evaluation

- a. Students will receive "Satisfactory" or "Unsatisfactory" for clinical and laboratory performance based upon:
 - i. Satisfactory achievement of:
 - a) All starred sub-outcomes
 - b) 50% of the remaining sub-outcomes
 - c) All outcomes as stated on the clinical evaluation form and as evaluated during clinical lab performance.
 - ii. Satisfactory attendance and participation in all clinical and simulation laboratory experiences.
 - iii. Students who do not satisfactorily complete assignments will be considered unsatisfactory clinically.

III. **Examination Policy:**

Exams will be administered online using Canvas exams. Academic integrity is to be always upheld during exam administration. Any concerns of a breach in this integrity will be reviewed by faculty committee and may result in disciplinary action and a grade of "0" for the exam.

1. Policy regarding examinations: The reasons for which a student will be excused from taking an examination at the appointed time, WITHOUT PENALTY, are:

- a. Hospitalization.
- b. Death in the immediate family.
- c. Personal illness - doctor's excuse required.

2. A student who misses an examination for any of the above is responsible for notifying the instructor **prior** to the exam, if possible, and arranging a make-up exam. The student will have **five** calendar days from the date of the examination in which to schedule the make-up exam. The make-up exam will cover the designated objectives; however, a different format or questions may be utilized. If the instructor is not notified within 24 hours of a missed exam, the student will receive an automatic "0" on the exam.

3. If an absence occurs due to emergency circumstances, the student should contact the instructor as soon as possible to arrange a make-up exam the same day. If a same day exam is not feasible, the student will need to contact the course instructor within 24 hours of the missed exam to discuss and schedule a make-up. Students are only allowed one missed exam without penalty.

4. Quizzes may occur at the discretion of the faculty. (They can be announced or unannounced at any time during the semester) No make-up opportunity will be given for absences of unscheduled quizzes.

IV. **Class Attendance and Homework Make-Up Policy:**

1. Class attendance is necessary to acquire the knowledge required to function properly and safely as a nurse. When class is missed, much important information is missed that cannot be obtained from other sources. As a result, the student suffers (less knowledge, lower test scores) and, ultimately, the patient suffers (as the nurse's knowledge and skills are lessened.) In addition, future employers look with disfavor on those whose attendance is sporadic and/or unreliable. For these reasons, class attendance is important, necessary and will be taken at all classes.

- a. Students are responsible for all handouts and/or lecture and lab notes during any absence.
 - i. Late submissions are subject to a penalty of 10% grade reduction every 24 hours pass the assignment deadline. ***All clinical simulation assignments must be completed to fulfill the mandatory clinical hour requirement***
 - ii. If a student has 3 or more late assignments, the subsequent late assignments will be recorded at 0%
- b. Attendance at all clinical experiences is required at the scheduled time for your group. **Refer to the student handbook regarding clinical absence.**
- c. Students must notify their clinical instructor via **phone call** if they are going to be late to clinical for any reason
- d. There will be no make-up for college labs.. ***Quizzes and Exams will be administered during scheduled lab times.*Please refer to the student handbook regarding make-up exams.**
- e. Students who are late to an exam/quiz without excused documentation will have their quiz or exam submitted at the normal quiz or examination end time. No extra time will be allotted for late arrival to a quiz or examination.

2. The reasons for which a student will be excused for clinical absences are:

1. Hospitalization (with documented verification)
2. Death in the immediate family (with documented verification)
3. Personal illness or illness in immediate family (doctor's excuse required)
4. Recommendation/required quarantine by governing facility/institution personnel

More than two excused absences per semester could result in an unsatisfactory in clinical. Anyone who receives an unsatisfactory in clinical will receive a course grade of 76% or lower.

All other absences are considered **unexcused**. More than one unexcused absence will result in an unsatisfactory in clinical. Anyone who receives an unsatisfactory in clinical will receive a course grade of 76% or lower.

If a day of scheduled clinical experience is missed, the student will be required to demonstrate his/her ability to meet the objectives for the missed clinical day. This will be accomplished in the clinical area or simulated environment.

- a. Arrangements for make-up work are to be made by the student with the clinical professor.
 - b. Clinical makeup days may be the financial responsibility of the student. The cost will be \$50.00 per clinical hour per student.
- b) **The instructor may dismiss a student from the clinical area if the instructor feels the student:**
- a. Is not physically or emotionally able to deal with the clinical experience
 - b. The student exhibits unprofessional behavior
 - c. The student is unprepared for the clinical day
 - d. The student is not able to safely participate in clinical demands and activities

*Unprofessional behavior includes, but is not limited to, profanity, being argumentative, or failing to adhere to facility policies. Being unprepared for clinical includes, but is not limited to, lacking any part of the student uniform. If asked to leave the clinical area for these reasons, that day will be considered an unexcused clinical absence and will therefore need to be rescheduled as a make-up day.

*****Unexcused clinical absences will be made up at the end of the semester and may be at the student's expense. *****

4. All assignments are to be submitted according to the following guidelines:

- a. Assignments must be written or typed using proper paragraph and sentence construction, grammar, and spelling.
- b. All assignments should have resources properly cited.
- c. All assignments are to be submitted on the designated date. Any extension of time for assignments will be determined by the faculty in accordance with circumstances. (See Student Handbook for Written Assignment Policy.)
- d. **All assignments should be original submissions of work completed by the student. If using AI for assignments please ensure the assignment allows the use of AI (most do NOT allow use of AI) and cite the use of AI appropriately.**

V. Classroom Expectations:

All students are expected to **demonstrate professional behavior and use language appropriate for the classroom learning experience. These expectations are for online, in person or at clinical.** The student is responsible for all materials and/or lecture notes during any absence.

1. The student must be able to display a professional attitude and behavior: reliability, respect for and cooperation with colleagues, willingness to work calmly and courteously under difficult conditions, determination to achieve first class work while meeting deadlines, respect for equipment and systems, and constructive response to criticism. This expectation is for both online class and in-person classes.
2. Students in RNUR2034 are responsible for the mandatory course requirements listed in the student handbook.
3. See the ADN Student Handbook to note the specific nursing requirements for science courses.
4. Students will be expected to prepare for all classes, laboratory, and assigned clinical experiences.
5. Students are expected to dress appropriately for all classes, including online class.
6. Students should be in a conducive place for learning while attending class in the online format. Sitting at a desk or table would be best in order to participate and take notes.
7. Each student will maintain a current CPR certificate, according to the student handbook, prior to the first clinical experience.
8. Students will submit all written clinical assignments to clinical instructors as required.
9. Students are advised to inform the course coordinator of any special conditions (physical, mental, or learning disability) that will require special accommodation on the first day of the semester following class.
10. If students have any specific difficulties with the course, they are encouraged to contact the course faculty.
11. Faculty, in consultation with the course coordinator, have the prerogative to modify the course syllabus if necessary.
12. Students are invited to attend faculty meetings on a space available basis. Students are not allowed to sit in on the closed sessions where confidential student information is discussed but are encouraged to join faculty to look at specific program policies and the nursing curriculum. Faculty meetings are usually held every Wednesday from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.; Students who wish to attend a meeting should coordinate this with the NC State Chapter of the National Student Nurse Association and should notify the Director of Nursing Programs prior to the meeting.
13. Cell phones, tablets, and other electronic devices are to be turned off during all classes and labs unless specified by instructors. Cell phones, tablets or any other electronic communication devices are not permitted at clinical sites (unless instructed by clinical faculty).
14. Student laptops and tablets may be used during class to assist with note taking and classroom work. Any other use is not permitted and will result in this permission being rescinded.

1. Each student is responsible for the mandatory program requirements listed in the Student Handbook. (If you do not have an ADN student handbook, obtain one from the Health Sciences secretary.)
2. Students must have current AHA BLS **CPR** certification to participate in clinical experiences. These are checked at orientation. An **up-to-date Mantoux (TB) and Tdap test** is required. Students are expected to receive the **yearly flu vaccine unless an exemption has been granted**.
3. All written assignments will be submitted typed using correct grammar, spelling, and sentence structure. Students are to use supplied forms when applicable.
4. Students are accountable for previous knowledge, content, and skills from their nursing education.
5. Students are expected to prepare for all class and clinical experiences assigned. Students are expected to obtain their clinical assignment before scheduled clinical experiences. Students are required to prepare for their clinical assignments by completing the written prep sheet according to directions from their clinical professors. Incomplete and unsatisfactory prep sheets will result in dismissal from clinical and an unsatisfactory clinical grade.
6. If you require reasonable accommodations because of a physical, mental, or learning disability, you must contact the course coordinator within the first two weeks of the semester.
7. The course faculty in conjunction with the course coordinator has the prerogative to modify the course syllabus if necessary.
8. Honors Credit- This course is available for honors credit.
