J. Course Description: This course focuses on the development and incorporation of clinical judgement within the role of the registered nurse. Foundational principles of nursing assessment, analysis, inference, and decision-making to develop enhanced critical thinking skills are emphasized. Students will learn to integrate evidence-based practice, ethical considerations, cultural competence, and clinical reasoning into safe and effective nursing care. Focus will be placed on developing proficiency in pattern recognition, prioritization of care, and anticipation of potential complications. Throughout the course students will collaborate with peers and faculty to effectively evaluate and prioritize client care using case studies, concept mapping, clinical scenarios, and reflective practices.

 2. All assignments are to be submitted on the designated date. Any extension of time for assignments will be determined by the faculty in accordance with circumstances. (See Student Handbook for Written Assignment Policy.)
 3. All assignments should be original submissions of work completed by the student. If using AI for assignments, please ensure the assignment allows the use of AI and cite the use of AI appropriately. (Note: most do NOT allow use of AI)
 4. Assignments that are graded as “S” (Satisfactory) or “U” (Unsatisfactory) must be submitted on time; late submissions will not be accepted and will automatically receive a grade of “U.”
 5. Technical malfunctions are not considered an automatic excuse for late submissions. Being prepared is an essential part of professional success.

Late submissions are subject to a penalty of 10% grade reduction every 24 hours past the assignment deadline up to 50%. If an assignment is submitted more than 5 days late, the grade will be recorded as a “0”. If a student has 3 or more late assignments, the subsequent late assignments will be recorded at “0”.
