- J. Course Description: This is a clinical course. The student will be assigned to a hospital eight (8) hours per week for eight weeks (64 total hours) to work under the direct supervision of a clinical instructor. This is an introductory clinical experience for the student to the practice respiratory care skills the student obtained in RESP1110. The student will perform direct patient care by evaluating patients' medical records, assessing patients' oxygen therapy needs, practice administration/assessment of medical gas therapy, humidity/aerosol therapy, perform oxygen analysis, perform sterilization/ infection control procedures, perform hyperinflation therapy, and bronchopulmonary hygiene techniques on patients. The student may be involved in emergency medical procedures include cardiopulmonary resuscitation and the use of manual resuscitators. Seminar time is provided at the practicum location during current hours.

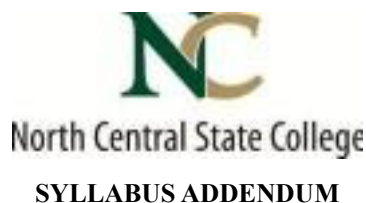

* Clinical procedure check-offs will be based on successful completion of the procedures listed in section I. Course Topical Outline.

All clinical procedure check-offs must be satisfactorily completed to receive a passing final grade. If all clinical procedure evaluations are NOT satisfactorily completed, the highest possible grade assigned is a D+.

** SOAPs will be graded according to the rubric supplied with the document and at the clinical instructors' discretion.

*** Student Evaluation will be completed by the clinical instructor in the final week of the clinical experience and will be based upon the evaluation available in Trajecsys Report System.

IV. Examination Policy:

1. The reasons for which a student will be excused from taking an examination
 - a. Hospitalization (with documented verification)
 - b. Death in the immediate family (with documented verification)
 - c. Personal illness or illness in immediate family - (doctor's excuse required).
2. A written or practical final exam will be administered at the discretion of the clinical instructor with respect to the unique experience at each clinical site. Students absent the day of an exam will have one week to make up the exam and are responsible for contacting the clinical instructor to make alternative arrangements. No cell phones will be permitted during exams.

V. Class Attendance and Homework Make-Up Policy:

A student may not miss TWENTY percent (20%) of the clinical time for whatever reason, excused or unexcused, the student CAN NOT meet the objectives of the course and the highest grade the student **will receive is a D+**. Defined as **32 hours** for RESP 1190. Attendance penalty guidelines for **excused absence**: a. first 4 hours no penalty, b. each additional 4 hours missed there will be -3% deducted from the student's final grade. Penalty for **unexcused absence**: 1% drop in grade for each hour or portion of an hour of unexcused absence. Missed hours will accumulate toward the 20% missed clinical time.

Students should plan with their clinical instructor to make up any missed clinical time. Failure to do so will result in a reduction of grade. If an arrangement between the student and clinical instructor cannot be reached, an additional assignment may be arranged at the discretion of the Director of Clinical Education or course coordinator.

VI. Classroom Expectations:

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You are expected to arrive at the clinical site and report to the designated meeting location prior to the scheduled start time. If you are going to be late or absent you are to contact the Clinical Instructor ASAP as well as Clinical Coordinator failure to do so will result in an Unexcused Absence. You are required to wear scrubs and have necessary equipment (stethoscope, scissors, pen, etc.) with you.
