III. Grading and Testing Guidelines:

1. Discussions are worth 35% (9 discussions)
2. Quizzes are worth 15% (7 quizzes)
3. Short Papers are worth 30% (5 short papers)
4. Final Exam is worth 20% (one exam with two parts)
5. Total = 100%
6. Each assignment in the course is worth 100 points. Your grade is reflective of 0-100 points, and this score corresponds with the numeric distribution on the syllabus (e.g., 93-100 is an A).
7. Each assignment in Canvas will have a point value and percentage.
8. At the end of the term, Canvas will convert the points and percentages for each assignment to provide a total percentage for the course, which translates to the numerical value on the syllabus, thereby giving an overall letter grade for the course.

IV. Examination Policy:

1. The reasons for which a student will be excused from taking an examination (a,b,c).
 - a. Hospitalization (with documented verification)
 - b. Death in the immediate family (with documented verification)
 - c. Personal illness or illness in immediate family - (doctor's excuse required).
2. A student who misses a quiz is responsible for contacting the instructor and must have documentation for the missed quiz. No extensions or makeup for the final exam.

NOTE:

All quizzes/exams are administered via Canvas. Students receive (1) attempt to complete each quiz/exam. The resolution of technical complications prior to the quiz/exam is the responsibility of the student and will not be accepted as an excuse for incomplete coursework. Students are responsible for maintaining the necessary materials including computers and internet access. If technical difficulties arise, it is the student's responsibility to seek out the appropriate support before the coursework is due. Contact information for IT-Helpdesk is provided within the course.

3. Students should attempt to complete the quizzes/exams as soon as possible after they become available/accessible, and not wait until right before they are due, so technical issues can be resolved before the due date. All quizzes have one essay question. Final exam questions consist of two essays for each part of the exam (Part 1, Part 2). There are module quizzes, and a comprehensive final exam. Students are responsible for making sure their work has been submitted.
4. Quizzes/exams that have not been officially submitted may appear as "in progress" and register as a zero if the student fails to click the "submit" button prior to the due date. It is the student's responsibility to make sure the quizzes/exams are submitted correctly.

V. Class Attendance and Homework Make-Up Policy:

1. Weekly class attendance and participation is necessary to meet critical course objectives and module learning outcomes for successful engagement with peers in course discussions and the completion of all other assignments in the module, and to demonstrate breadth and depth knowledge of course material as outlined in the syllabus.
 - a. Grade is determined by completed assigned coursework
 - b. Students must receive a passing grade for the course to meet the course objectives.
2. Students are responsible for incorporating material from the theory section of the module as well as the online (OER) textbook for discussions and essays. Students are responsible for using APA style for all submitted assignments unless otherwise indicated.
 - a. Ensuring ALL coursework is completed according to directions.
 - b. Submitting ALL coursework according to the scheduled due dates.

There is no graded attendance policy; however, there is weekly graded coursework which will count as attendance. Failure to check-in the course regularly could potentially have an impact on the student's ability to stay apprised and submit work on time.

This instructor posts a weekly announcement, and the student should be aware of any other announcements posted throughout the week.

The ethics course in Canvas is available to all students 24/7. Students are given ample time for, and advance notice of all coursework; therefore, make-up work is not permitted. It is important that each student fully understands that make-up work is not permitted in this class. Requests for special chances to make-up work will be denied. In the case of extreme unforeseen and uncontrollable circumstances, such as the death of an immediate family member, student hospitalization, etc. make-up work may be considered only if contact is made with the instructor and proper documentation is provided.
