This is an asynchronous course; therefore, attendance is measured in the regularity with which the student submits assignments. The student doesn't need to log in a required number of times per week. Any assignment submitted over one week after the due date will be heavily penalized unless the student is in an emergency that has been discussed with the instructor ahead of time. See section above for details on what constitutes an emergency. Penalties for this type of work often result in very few points being assigned, and they are assigned at the instructor's discretion. No work, including any final exams or projects, will be accepted beyond the last day of the course.
